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WELCOME

Australians have long crossed the Torres Strait to make films in Papua New Guinea. Between 1906 and 1975, the territories of Papua and New Guinea were Australian protectorates, and cinema played an important role in promoting the colonial agenda to an audience at home and abroad.

In the 1930s, gold prospectors penetrated the highland areas of central New Guinea with maps and bulky 35mm camera equipment only to find a population of one million people living in its mountainous valleys. Following the Pacific War, Australians were increasinaly keen to learn more about their northern neighbours and the Film Australia Collection provides a unique insight into the history of PNG at this time through the lens of the government filmmaker. In the early 1970s, a new generation of vouna, politically aware Australian filmmakers arrived in PNG to document the extraordinary period of change preceding independence in 1975.

To mark the 40th anniversary of independence we proudly present a season of films from all these eras. We are doubly proud to have significant Australian filmmakers and historians to personally present them and discuss their historical, social and political context, including Michael Waterhouse, Gary Kildea, Andrew Pike, Les McLaren and Bob Connolly.

The Film Australia cameras were also trained on our protectorate and neighbour PNG, and we share just a selection of the rich and complex history of traditional life, colonial invasion, war and impacts from industry the Film Australia crew captured.

COLONISTS FOR A DAY

In 1994, director Alex Morgan compiled this previously unseen footage recording the KIAPS (Australian patrol officers) crusading into the PNG interior to impose 'pax Australiana.'

Documenting the work of Tom Ellis, District Commissioner in the New Guinea highlands.

MOUNT HAGEN SHOW

In a country with over 700 different language groups, the Mount Hagen Show was established to promote peace and tolerance. The Film Australia cameras capture one of the first shows.

Chronicling the lives and work of some 2000 young Australian men who served as Patrol Officers in Papua New Guinea between the end of the Second World War and Independence in 1975. They were known by Papua New Guinea people as *Kiaps*, derived from the German word *Kapitan*.

MICHAEL WATERHOUSE LECTURES

Historian and economist Michael Waterhouse presents two illustrated lectures about life on the New Guinea goldfields in the 1930s. The lectures feature rare early footage from the NFSA collection and the Mitchell Library shot by his grandfather, Leslie Waterhouse, who worked as a director of Bulolo Gold Dredging and Guinea Airways in the 1930s. Michael is the author of Not a Poor Man's Field. The New Guinea Goldfields to 1942 – An Australian Colonial History.

In this two-hour presentation, Waterhouse shares the full complement of footage he has discovered and curated in the course of his research. This will be the first time this film has been shown in public in its entirety, and includes some unique black-and-white footage of life on the Sepik River in the early 1930s, possibly the earliest such film in existence.

SIGNIFICANT AUSTRALIAN PNG DOCUMENTARY

The soon-to-be and later newly independent nation of Papua New Guinea was a fascinating draw for young Australian documentary filmmakers in the 1970s and 80s. In this series we take a retrospective look at their work and invite them to share the stories not told on screen.

DENNIS O'ROURKE

The filmmaking world mourned the tragic loss of Dennis O'Rourke to cancer in 2013. His legacy included some of Australia's most talked about documentary (*The Good Waman of Bangkok, Cunnamulla*) and a wealth of chronicles of evolving lives and livelihoods in the Pacific (*Sharkcallers* of Kontu, Cannibal Tours). In Yumi Yet O'Rourke's camera is trained on the new nation's independence.
